Queens Cross projects sup

During the ongoing cost of living crisis, the Association has delivered several projects to support residents in our communities.

PANTRY PARTNERSHIP PROVIDES FREE COMMUNITY MEALS

undreds of local residents received free warm meals in a welcoming community space following an Association partnership with The Courtyard Pantry Enterprise.

Ten community meal sessions were provided at Toshie's Café on Garscube Road followed by a further four community meal events at Dundasvale Residents Hall.

These popular sessions saw between 20 and 30 people attend each meal, providing a dignified dining experience in a warm space where people could socialise and meet others.

Jamie Ballantine, Social Regeneration Manager said: "Thanks to funding support from the Glasgow City Council and the National Lottery we worked The Courtyard Pantry Enterprise to deliver a programme of 15 free community meal events between February and May, including a community barbecue at The Courtyard on the 13 May 2023, to coincide with our Queens Cross Community Foundation sponsored walk."

Financial Wellbeing staff also attended some of the sessions to offer welfare benefits advice and help those experiencing immediate financial difficulty access food and energy vouchers - see more about this on page 5.

Over 200 people attended these community meals with many highlighting the value of them:

The Courtyard Pantry Enterprise manage The Courtyard Pantry in Westercommon, providing weekly access to substantially discounted groceries to members.

They also run Toshie's – the new community café on Garscube Road serving tasty breakfast and lunch meals, sweet treats and coffee to local residents.

CHILDRENS HOLIDAY PROGRÂMMES

ommunity meals complement the other work we do to support people in our communities during these challenging times.

The Association also delivers children's holiday programmes that provide quality activities during the Easter and summer holidays with access to food and snacks for those taking part. Last Easter 117 children participated in our holiday programme, which is supported with funding from the Glasgow City Council Children's Holiday Food Programme.

HUNDREDS OF HOUSEHOLDS RECEIVE VOUCHER SUPPORT

ver 700 Queens Cross households have been given energy and food vouchers to help support them through the cost of living crisis. Thanks to funding from the SFHA Winter Hardship Fund and Social Housing Fuel Support Fund, welcome financial help has been provided to residents during a particularly difficult time.

ENERGY AND FOOD SUPPORT

The money has gone towards top up vouchers for prepayment meters and food vouchers, helping over 700 households.

Suzanne Wight, of the financial wellbeing team, said: "With the increased cost of essentials, paying for food and

fuel has been very challenging.

"This funding has been a real boost, helping some households with gas. electricity, and food costs."

The feedback we've received demonstrates the need for this help and the difference it has made.

Our Financial Wellbeing team have helped tenants and residents to access over £1 million in benefits support household incomes.

HELP FOR FAMILIES THROUGH GLASGOW BABY FOOD BANK

he Association also accessed funding to provide food vouchers for people accessing the Glasgow Baby Food Bank.

The Baby Food Bank is a vital service which helps ease the strain for vulnerable families by providing vital baby essentials, clothing and equipment.

Sixty-two vouchers worth £20 each have been allocated to families

Cost of Living

- Government help available to you

he past few months have been very difficult with food and fuel costs increasing, and there have been various government schemes to support households through this time.

Make sure you're receiving everything you're entitled to by checking out each scheme below.

Energy Bills Support Scheme

Every household should have received six payments totalling £400 between October 2022 and March 2023 to reduce energy costs.

For most, this will have been paid either as a credit on your bill, as a refund or a credit on your smart meter.

For those with a traditional style prepayment meter, you may have received a voucher by text, email or phone. If you haven't received this, please contact your supplier. The deadline to redeem your voucher is 30 June.

Cost of Living Payments 2023/24


You may be entitled to three Cost of Living payments if you are in receipt of a qualifying benefit:

Disability Cost of Living payment

A payment of £150 will be paid during summer 2023 if you are in receipt of a disability payment such as child disability payment, adult disability payment, PIP or DLA.

Pensioner Cost of Living Payment

If you are entitled to a winter fuel payment 2023/24, you will receive an extra payment from November 2023. If you are eligible, you will receive a letter in October confirming how much you'll receive - £150 or £300, depending on circumstances.

JOHN GRAY BURSARY SCHEME - Community Foundation STILL TIME TO APPLY

Applicants have until 30 June to apply for the scheme

he John Gray Bursary scheme is open for applications for the coming academic year. The Bursary was created by the Queens Cross Community Foundation in 2022 for residents living in the Queens Cross Housing Association area of operation.

Up to £2,000 bursary

Applicants can apply for up to £2,000 to help support them during their studies at college or university. Last year awards totalling £10,000 helped six students starting full-time and part-time courses buy educational essentials such as textbooks, laptops or tablets.

The bursary helped people starting college or university, supporting local people from our communities as they embark on their studies.

Inspired by former Queens Cross Housing Association chairperson John Gray, the fund is intended to offer financial support to people who could benefit from financial assistance to progress their education.

Helps with expenses

Feedback from last year's beneficiaries emphasised how the bursary has helped them. One student said: "Without the scheme it would have been very difficult for me to do my course. As a first year student I wasn't aware of all the expenses that university life comes with.

Another student said: "The scheme has made a very big difference to my studies so far. I was able to buy essential textbooks and an iPad to help me stay organised."



Woodside Making Places update



lans were in place for the ambitious Woodside Making Places project to begin in autumn 2022.

However, the project has been delayed by a combination of factors - particularly the post-pandemic impact on the construction industry.

More funding needed

This has led to the costs of the project increasing considerably and more funding needed to get the project underway.

We have applied to the Scottish Government for further funding and await the outcome of our application.

Woodside Making Places presents a tremendous opportunity for Woodside. Our vision is to create attractive and multifunctional green and open spaces for the community to use and enjoy.

Plans include green infrastructure such as pathways for walking and wheeling, habitats that promote biodiversity, new spaces for doorstep play and sustainable rainwater drainage systems.

LOOKING TO MOVE HOME? FINDMYHOME CAN HELP

ind My Home is our online housing information, advice and lettings service.

If you are looking to move home, visit **findmyhome.org.uk** to register for a transfer.

You can complete the form on a computer, tablet or smart phone or, if you need help, you can contact us to ask for an appointment.

We advertise available properties every Wednesday at midday and the adverts run for one week.

Placing bids

If you see a property you are interested in, you can place a "bid" which tells us that you would like to be considered for the property. When the property advert ends, we receive a list of everyone who has bid for the property, sorted in order

of their housing priority. We offer the property to the first suitable applicant on the list.

More information about the bidding process can be found on the Find My Home website.

Demand is high just now

The demand for our properties is very high, so applicants with low housing priority may wait a long time for an offer of housing.

We encourage all applicants to consider other housing options, such as registering with other landlords who have properties in the area or looking for a mutual exchange.

Funding in place for new west end social housing

housing homes in Glasgow's
West End is now in place.

The development will replace a derelict hostel built in 1961, and work on demolishing the building ahead of construction is now complete.

Burnbank Gardens

The flats are being built at Burnbank Gardens, on the south side of the communal garden, in partnership with Glasgow West Housing Association.

The flats are designed to meet the needs of older people with eight of the flats adaptable for wheelchair users.

Each upper floor of the two closes in the block will have a sundeck and balconies for residents to socialise in the fresh air, while the ground floor has a shared rear garden for each close. The six-storey building includes materials such as stone facing to complement the Conservation Area.

Funding partners

Funding for the development is coming from the Scottish Government's Affordable Housing Supply Programme, Glasgow City Council, Queens Cross Housing and Glasgow West Housing Association.

Twenty four flats will be owned by Queens Cross and 24 will be transferred to Glasgow West HA when completed.

Queens Cross and Glasgow West HA together manage around 6,000 homes across the north-west of the city.

"This hostel has been a blight on this conservation area for many years so to finally be able to replace it with much needed social housing for older people is great news," said Queens Cross's Chief Executive, Shona Stephen.

"We have worked hard with our partners to get funding in place and

also with our architects to deliver a building in keeping with this highly desirable neighbourhood."

Elaine Travers, Chief Executive of Glasgow West HA said;

"We are delighted to see this project progressing and look forward to providing new energy efficient, affordable homes for older people within the Burnbank community."

Councillor Kenny McLean,
Convener for Housing at Glasgow
City Council, said: "The building
of these much-needed social-rent
homes in the West End of the city is
very welcome, and will bring new life
to this site. We are delighted to have
supported this development, and
look forward to working with our
project partners on its delivery."

Construction work will start in the summer and the flats will be ready for tenants moving in by summer 2025.

FREE BULK UPLIFT SERVICE


o you know that we work with Total Home Co-Operative to offer a free bulk uplift service? Since charges for bulk uplift were introduced across Glasgow in 2021, many residents can't afford to pay for uplift and don't have the means to dispose of bulk themselves.



Pick-ups through Total Homes can be made directly from your home within three days of your request - so there's no need to leave your bulk uplift on the street.

Total Homes operate a circular economy model with 80% of all the waste they collect upcycles, reused or repurposed.

PAVING ART CREATED AT CEDAR STREET

resh colours and intricate designs have lit up Woodside Gardens after new paving art was installed.

Artists Hamish Bigg from Bigg Design and Eleanor Young from Fun Makes Good created the eyecatching artwork after hearing the thoughts of the local community.

Residents were encouraged to submit their own ideas at a drop in session earlier this year, while pupils from local schools and Woodside Nursery shared their own visions for the Gardens with drawings.

The final design reflects those

ideas and includes colourful plants, flowers, fruit and wildlife.

The project is funded by Cycling Scotland, and the installation is part of garden improvement works that saw a new garden path installed by AMEY as a community benefit project.

The new tarmac path and lowered kerbs makes the gardens more accessible, and the artwork adds colour and vibrancy to the new black top surface.

One local tenant said: "The colours are so vibrant, there will be year-round colour at Woodside Gardens."





Update on our People Age 60+ service



ue to Glasgow Health and Social Care Partnership funding cuts, the Association can no longer offer the intervention service to our older residents.

But we do still provide the following services to tenants age 60 and above.

Older People's Wellbeing Service

The Older People's Wellbeing Service helps people manage their tenancy if age related health and mobility concerns reduce their confidence. We ensure regular contact so that people can live independently and at home in their community.

This can include helping arrange repairs or adaptations, accessing money and benefits advice, providing updates about events and activities or getting help from other services.

Enhanced Housing Management

Through our enhanced housing management service, you'll have access to the OKEachDay Service. We'll send you an OKEachDay device which you press each day to confirm you're ok, helping you feel safe and secure in your tenancy.

We'll also carry out monthly tenancy checks to help you manage your tenancy. If you're in need of extra support, we'll set up a referral, with your permission, and work with other agencies such as the Glasgow City Health and Social Care Partnership to make sure you're getting the support you need.

A new project has been set up in partnership with Maryhill Tesco to help tackle loneliness and isolation.

Brunch and blether provides healthy cooking workshops and a free lunch to tenants who also have access to games, resources and a safe space for people to connect and share similar interests.

These sessions are well attended and provide a sense of belonging. They help boost self-esteem and confidence and group members act as a support network for each other.

They talk and provide support to those going through a tough time, illness, a loss, or a major life transition.



Men's group

The men's groups provide camaraderie as men come together to play recreational games such as pool, darts and



chess as well as discuss their lives, health, and hobbies.

The 60+ men's group takes place at Cromwell Street while a 40+ men's group runs at The Courtyard, Westercommon – both taking place every Tuesday. It's a great programme for men looking for friendship and support.

Members are offered a supportive environment where they can talk openly and honestly, relax and build friendships with others in the community.

A free lunch from The Courtyard Enterprise is also provided.

They grow many different types of fruit, vegetables, plants and flowers in their spaces, and host engaging and informative food and gardening focused events which celebrate diversity and collaboration.





Sod cutting marks start of Hamiltonhill regeneration

ork is officially underway to create over 600 new mixed-tenure homes and apartments, complemented by new improved parks and greenspaces in Hamiltonhill.

Queens Cross will deliver apartments and terraced housing in one of Glasgow's key regeneration areas in partnership with regeneration specialist Urban Union, part of Robertson Group.

Four phases over 10 years

Delivered over a 10-year period, the regeneration will comprise four phases and includes green spaces, parks and a community garden, which have been developed with input from the local community who have played a key part in the planning process and open space provision. The first of the new park spaces is due to complete in the summer of 2023.

Representatives from Queens Cross and Urban Union attended an official sod cutting event to mark the start on site of phase 1 of the development which will deliver 178 social homes for rent and 30 for sale.

Shona Stephen, Queens Cross Housing Association chief executive, said: "Our Hamiltonhill development is the biggest project the association has ever undertaken.

"We're really excited to be working with Urban Union to deliver transformational change to the area building a new green neighbourhood in the city.

Neil McKay, managing director of Urban Union, said: "The regeneration of Hamiltonhill embodies the ambition of Queens Cross Housing Association to reinvigorate and revitalise the neighbourhoods in north of Glasgow situated along the canal corridor. We are delighted to be delivering this landmark development and to welcome guests to site today to mark the official start.

"We look forward to working closely with the local community over the next decade and to play our part in creating a vibrant neighbourhood and community with a diverse and inclusive mix of high-quality homes."
